



IMPACTS FROM COMPETITIVE COMMUNITY EMPLOYMENT

Individuals with disabilities have so much to offer when given a chance. Through The Arc of Evansville's Community Job Link program and Arc Enclaves, individuals with disabilities are able to secure community-based employment. We recently spoke with a few individuals who have experienced first-hand how The Arc's support helps each of them achieve their full potential.

PHILIP

It didn't take long for Philip to find his stride at Bosse Field, where he started working for the Evansville Otters this summer. He's worked several jobs through the Community Job Link program for many years but decided to take some time off in 2020. This year he felt he was ready for a new work experience where he could gain new skills. At the beginning of the summer, after just a month, he learned how to help prepare and wrap food in the concession stands. His role grew to include assisting the cashiers and helping keep the 3 main concession stands stocked. Philip's supervisor was immediately impressed with his attentiveness and eagerness to continue learning new skills. With the assistance of the Community Job Link program, Philip was matched with a job that fits his skillset and has given him a chance to flourish in the workplace.





ADAM

Adam is considered a staple at Bud's Harley-Davidson, where he's been employed for 3 years. When he was first hired, Adam already had a wide range of skills he learned through previous Community Job Link positions he's worked at over the last 12 years. Those skills, combined with the new things he's learned, enable him to now do his work with complete independence. He manages his workday and job responsibilities, increasing his confidence and providing a sense of empowerment.

MICHAEL

Though he might seem shy at first, Michael lights up when you ask him about his job. Michael has been working at The Arc's MetroNet Enclave for a year and a half. His responsibilities include organizing, repackaging, and labeling Wi-Fi units sent off to be used in the field. Michael's supervisor, David, is proud of the tremendous progress Michael has made in his self-confidence. He is comfortable making his own decisions, taking the initiative to complete tasks that need to be done, and finding a sense of pride and fulfillment from a job well done.


