Perhaps the biggest change The Arc of Evansville experienced

in this past year was the retirement of long-time President and Executive Director, Deidra Conner, who successfully led the organization for many years and prepared The Arc for future success. This retirement, in addition to the retirement of Kelly Barnett who served as the Vice President of Adult Services, has resulted in the formation of a brand new leadership team at The Arc of Evansville.

Coming into an organization with an eager new leadership team is an exciting time for an incoming Executive Director. In just a few months, it is clear that The Arc's leadership team is high energy, innovative, and flexible. This, along with a supportive and involved board of directors, will lead to purposeful change and will result in meaningful outcomes for the people supported by the organization!

The Arc of Evansville is also undergoing changes with how supports and services will be offered in the future. All providers in Indiana and the country are working through these changes and no one knows quite what that looks like yet. What we do know is that change can be hard and changing our current practices will be difficult, but if we think about previous changes in the field – the movement toward equal educational opportunities with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, increased community inclusion in public accommodation with the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Fair Housing Amendments Act, and most recently the movement away from state schools, institutions, and facilities and toward home and community based services – we are on the verge of ensuring that people with disabilities have every possible opportunity to lead the lives that they find personally meaningful as they go about their daily activities.

of individuals served were satisfied with their services.


All staff received specific training directed by family members of individuals served.


